

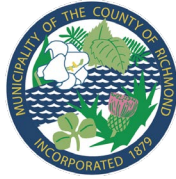

Doug Landry called the meeting to order at 6:06 p.m.

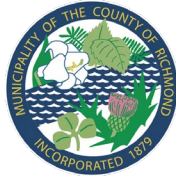
Items Added to the Agenda

Motion carried.

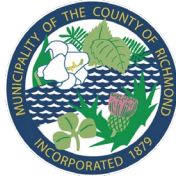
Litter Reduction Strategies for Roadside Waste

Hi,

My name is Sgt. Mike Lidstone with the RCMP. I am the Police Coordinator for Nova Scotia Crime Stoppers. I grew up in West Bay Road and have lot of family and friends in Richmond County and spend a great deal of time in Cape Breton.

Cape Breton was managed for many years by Cape Breton Crime Stoppers but their board recently folded so God's Country is now being covered by Nova Scotia Crime Stoppers. One of the main goals of Crime Stoppers is to increase our profile in the community so that public uses us as a means to create safer communities for families to live and for businesses to operate.

In order to increase our profile one of the major campaigns is simply to advertise Crime Stoppers by installing our 5 inch by 8 inch decals at various locations. We have partnered with many businesses such as port-a-pottie companies, dumpster companies, Inverness racetrack, restaurants and various stores to help advertise Crime Stoppers. We simply want to keep reminding people that Crime Stoppers is an option to create safer communities.

I would like for Nova Scotia Crime Stoppers to partner with Richmond County by simply allowing us to display our decals at appropriate locations- on lamp posts, community trash cans or other appropriate locations. We also have large metal street signs installed throughout various communities in the province -usually placed entering a town. These are usually installed by the municipality at a location of their choosing.

I hope you would consider these ideas as a means to make our lovely part of the world a safer place. If you have any ideas yourself we are always open to trying new ways to create safer communities.

Dear Mr. MacCulloch:

The Nova Scotia RCMP received thousands of calls for service in 2023. Our teams advanced hundreds of investigations and laid charges for many serious offences, including sexual assault, human trafficking, illicit drugs and homicide.

As the provincial police, and through collaboration with the Government of Nova Scotia, municipalities and First Nations communities we serve, we tailor our crime reduction strategies from year-to-year.

We've recently published a web-based annual review (<https://rcmp.ca/en/nova-scotia/corporate-information/publications-and-manuals/your-nova-scotia-rcmp-2023>) that highlights several operational files that demonstrate our work to combat gender-based violence; hate crime; human trafficking; internet child exploitation; and serious and organized crime. It also includes examples of special projects, our involvement in community events across the province, and policing data.

Although this report offers only a small snapshot of our day-to-day policing work, it reflects our employees' dedication to serve and protect Nova Scotians.
